Then, I found an obituary my father had kept about his cousin, Merton Radway (who had grown up on Swift Road). Merton

had graduated from Fabius Union High School and attended the NYS College of Forestry at Syracuse before accepting a position with the U.S. Forest Service as superintendant of a Civilian Conservation Corps camp. (It doesn't say which one.)

After returning to college and graduating, he worked for the Fish and Wildlife Service. Merton was responsible for Montezuma's development for several years and had his research on muskrats published. The obituary also stated that he managed a project producing bolts of willow wood that were used in the manufacture of prosthetics during World War II.

A big thank you goes to Barbara Rivette for sending me the 1957 article about the Fabius Grange No. 1404. I have included it in this newsletter.

I hope you enjoy the other articles that I have included.

These future programs will be held at the Fabius Community Center:

Sat., January 3, 1p.m.—Cheryl Pula will present us with information on the Hope Diamond.

Sat., February 7, 1p.m.-Catherine Landis, a grad student at ESF, will discuss historic plants found in central New York.

Sat., March 7, 1 p.m.--Pamela Vittorio, who works with the Chittenango Landing Canal Boat Museum, will present a program on the Erie Canal Superstitions. FABIUS GRANGE NO. 1404

Forty-five Brothers and Sisters interested in promoting agriculture met in the Free Will Baptist Church on Oct. 25, 1916 with Deputy Master Joslah Fablus organized the Betts and used Members The Grange. Church for their meetings and reimbursed them by paying the taxes and making necessary repairs. Efforts were made to purchase the Church property for a Grange Home as early as 1917 but this was not accomplished until 1924, as no person or groups could be found with authority to make the transfer. The Baptist Corporation in Maine was finally contacted, a contract was made, and the purchase was completed in 1924 for \$700. Part of the principal was raised by subscription and the remainder borrowed from a local Bank. Another loan was necessary to reroof the building. The Church Bell was sold to the Vesper Church for \$100. This money was used to reduce the note.

A County wide banquet was held in 1931 and the proceeds used to paint the Grange Home. The Grange sponsored a dance on Aug. 14, 1935 with great success. These proceeds were used to remodel the Hall and apply on the note.

In 1945 all 25 Year Members were honored and the Grange gave \$100 toward the purchase of the Doctor's House in town. Aid is given to the bloodbank each year in cooperation with the Fabius Central School as a Community Service project. A very active Juvenile Grange was organized at one time, but was forced to become inactive when it became difficult to find someone to be its Matron or Patron.



THE DERUYTER RESERVOIR.

Something of its History and Use-Very Low This Year.

Lucius Hathaway of the extreme northern part of the town of Cuyler recently informed a Standard man that the Delluyter reservoir has been lower this season than at any time during the past thirty years.

Mr. Hathaway said be could well remember when what is now the reservoir proper was only a large never falling spring covering an area of nearly five acres. About forty years ago the state purchased the farms of Bradley Merchant, Britton Allen, Berton Reed and John Pope at a nominal price for the purpose of flooding the same and making head water for a state feeder for the Eric canal. The reservoir is still used for that end. Its outlet is near Fayetteville and Maulius. The state authorities built a large dam 70 feet high and the four farms besides other adjoining lands were submerged and a body of water covering over 800 acres has been maintained by the state ever since. When at high water mark the surface measures 2 miles in length and I mile wide.
