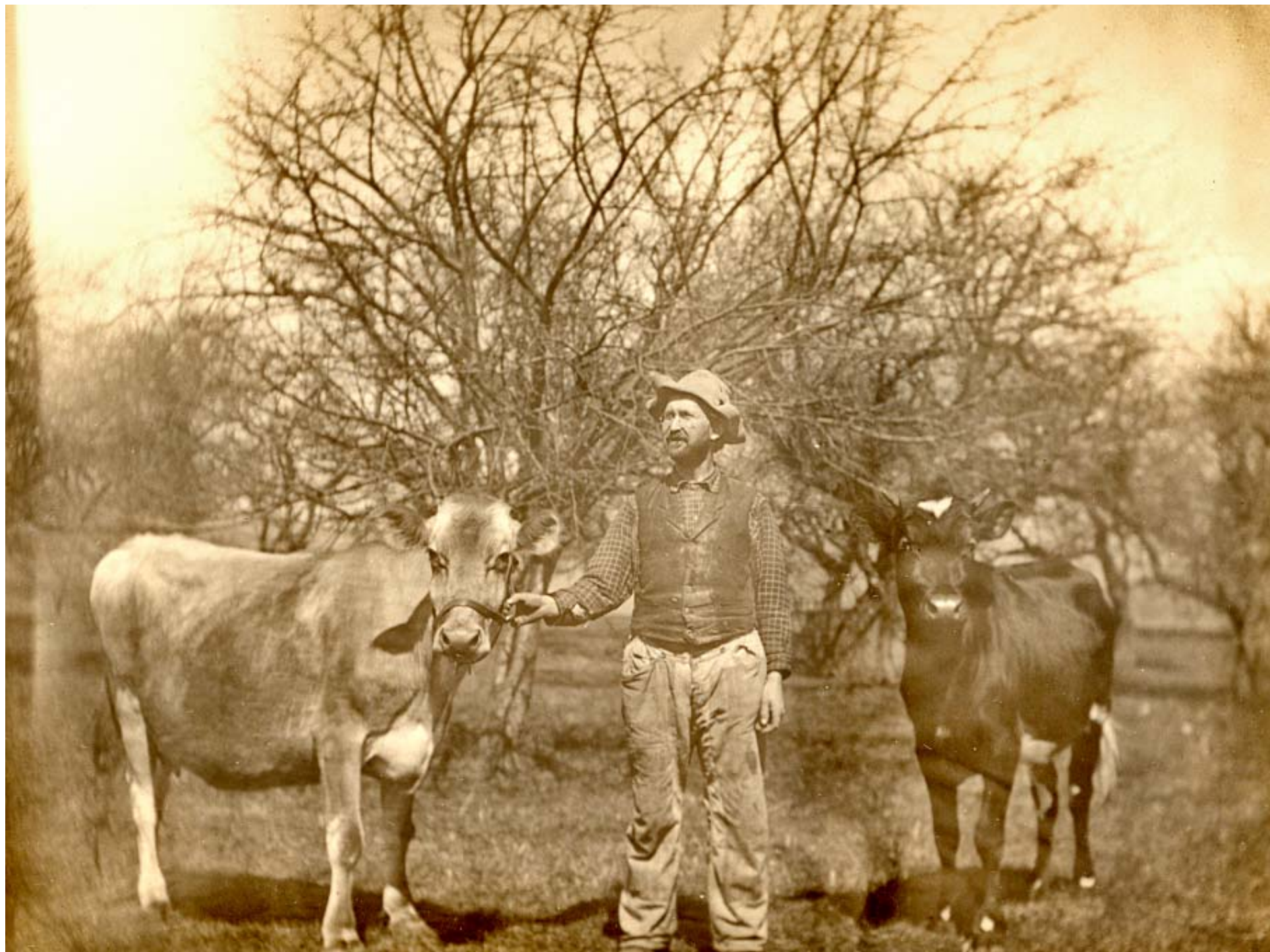

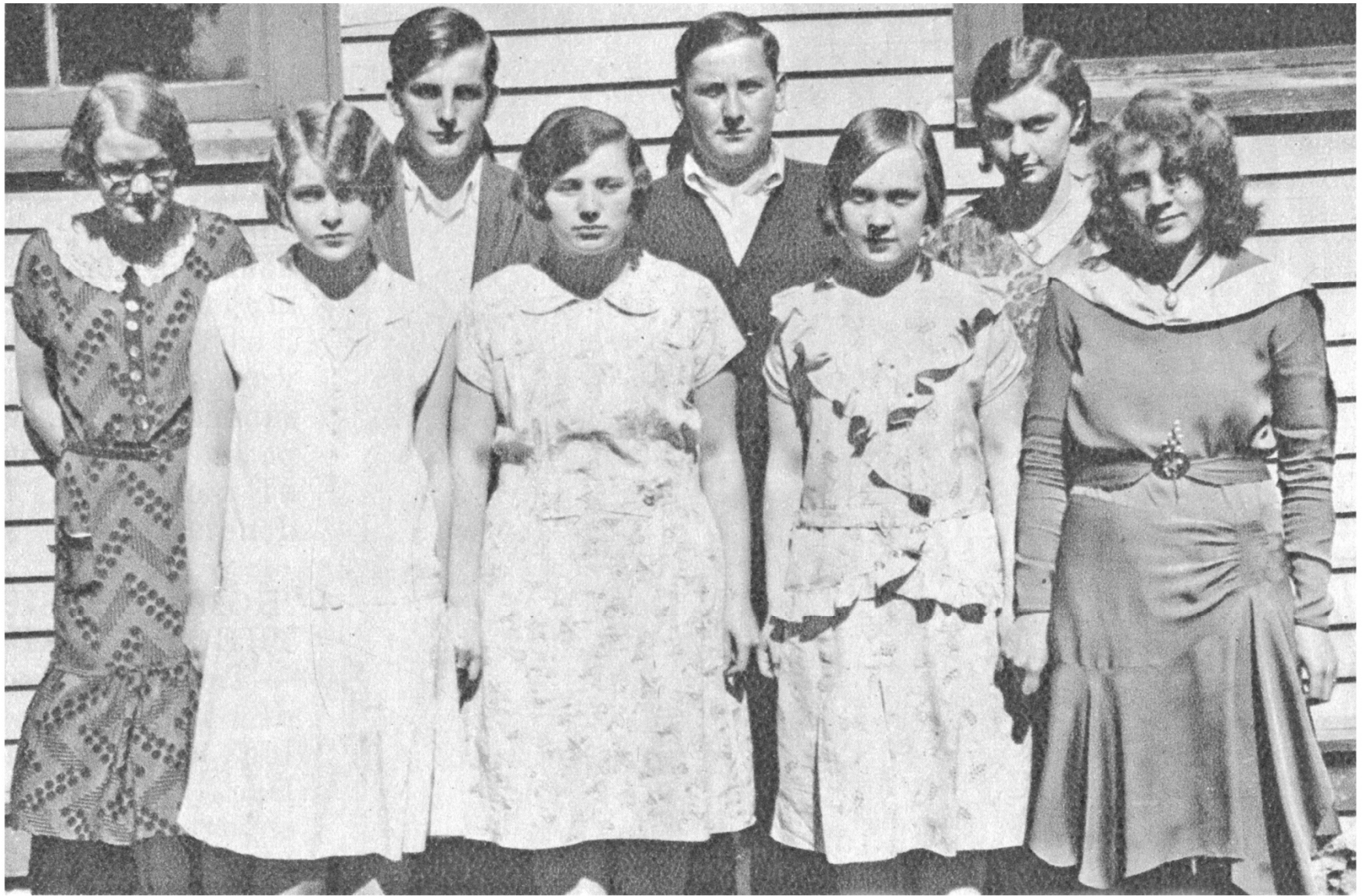

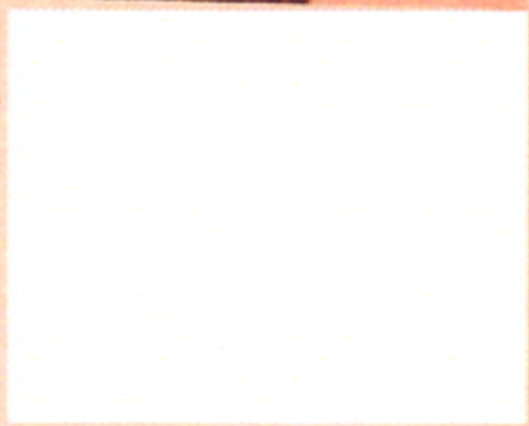
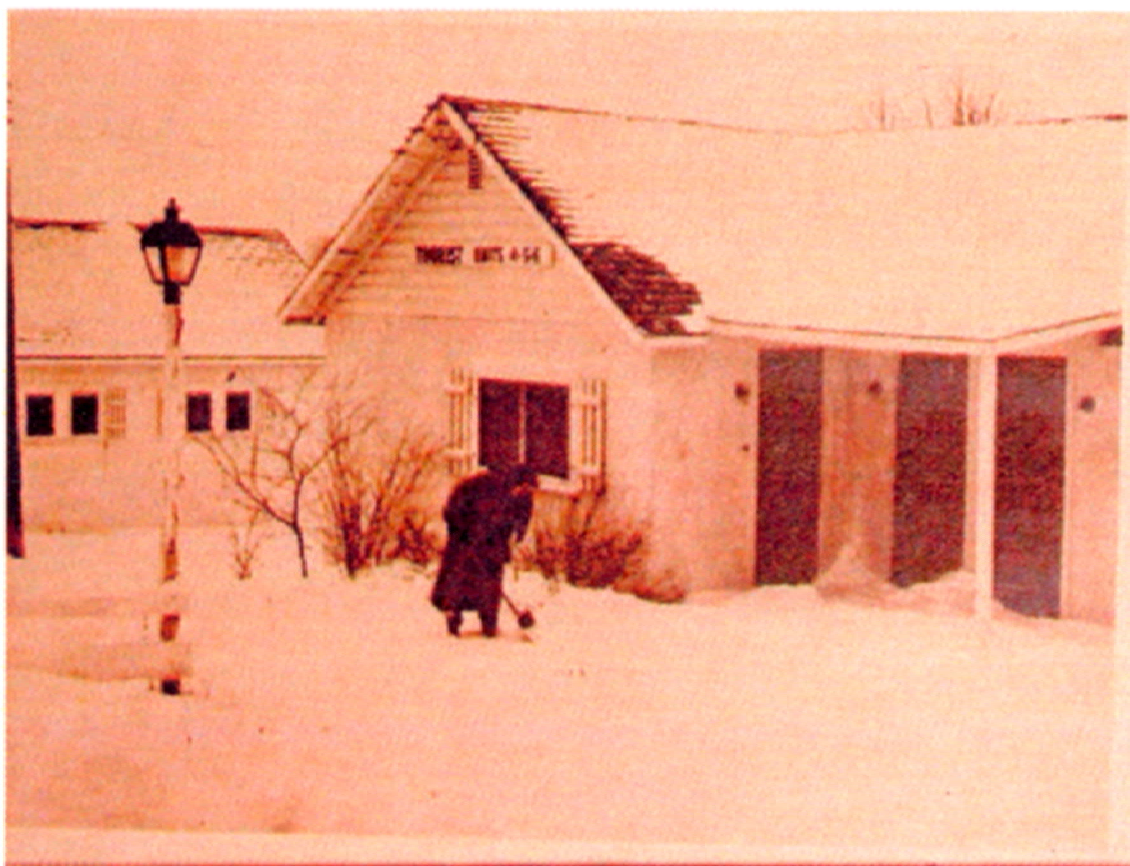












TOURIST CABINS—Here are two of the attractive Estey tourist cabins at Pompey Center. Columnist Emily Estey clears away the snow.

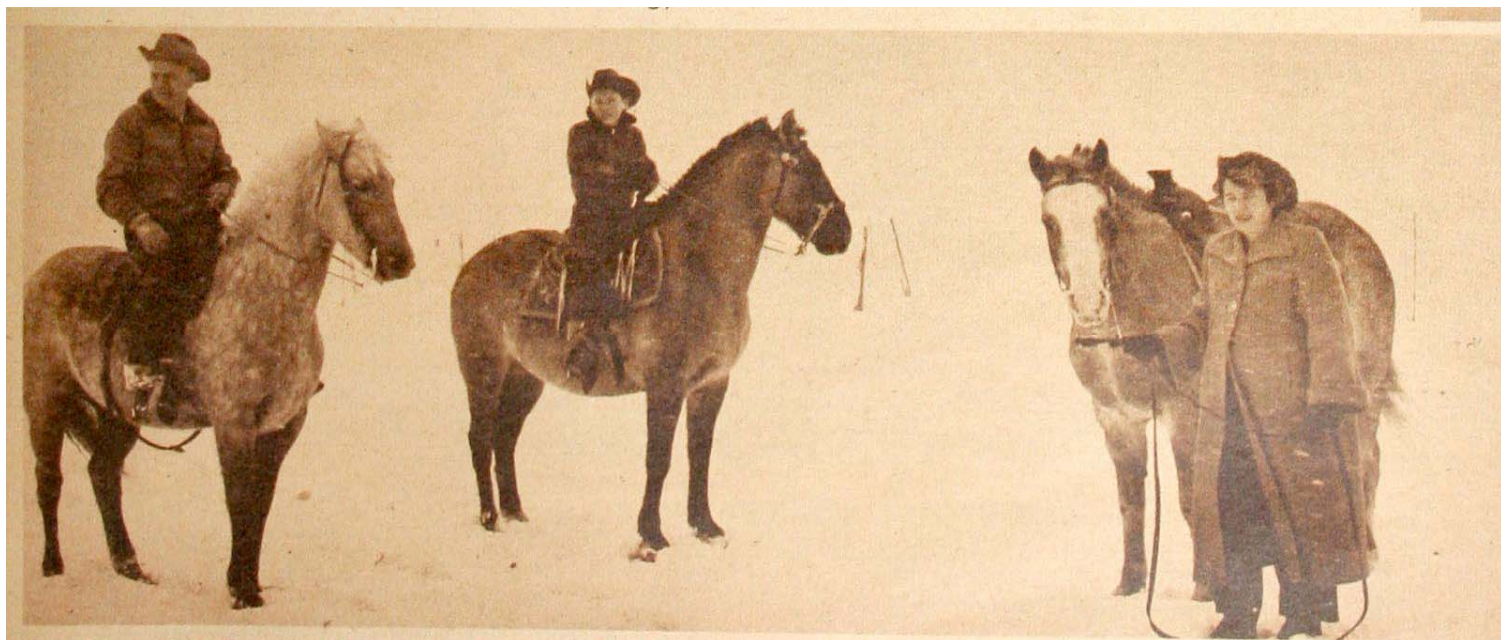


NA JEAN—Myrna Jean Estey, 16, junior at Cazenovia Central, helps her mother keep the tourist cabins tidy.

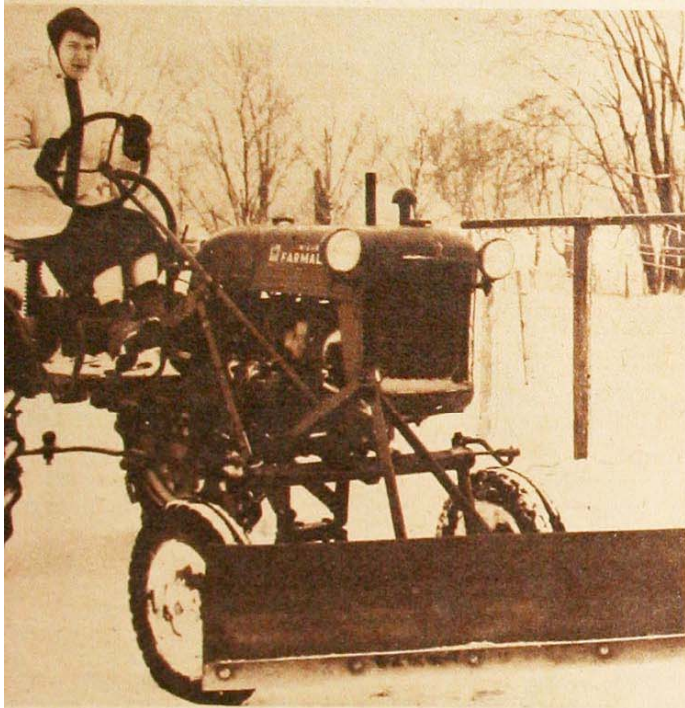

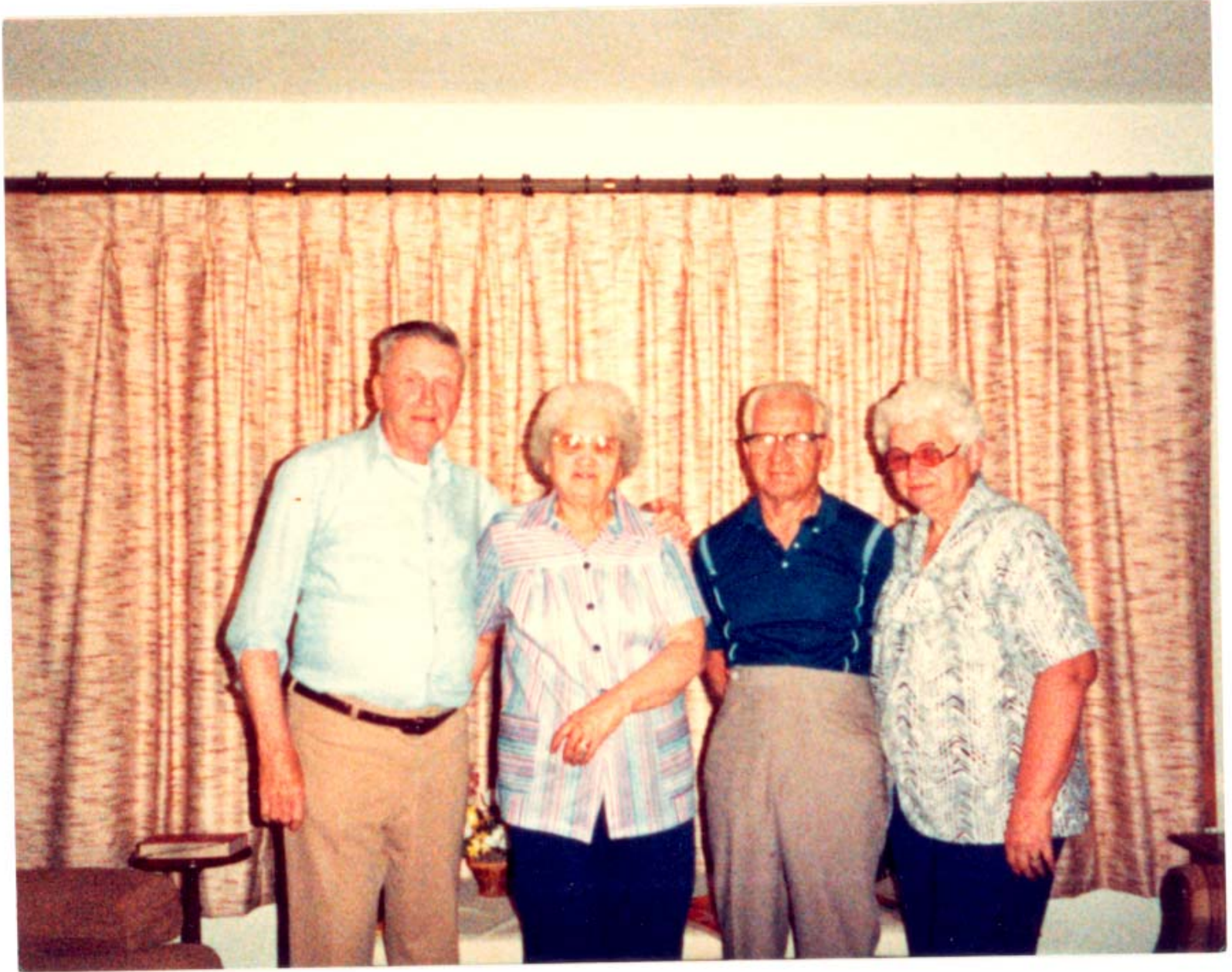
